The Resurrection, Gift of Divine Love

Love does not exist unless it is given away. In the Christian faith, God gave God's love away by creating the Incarnation – which was the person of Jesus. And Jesus' love for humanity was given away when he offered himself up to death. God gave Jesus, and Jesus gave his life – all done in a love that was given away. And in both cases, the love continues.

Easter is the witness that love is stronger than death.

That is sometimes hard to believe, and difficult to embrace. It certainly was for Peter, who has a rather famous conversation as recorded in John's Gospel. Three times the risen Christ asks Peter, "Peter, do you love me?" (John 21:16) Three times Peter answers that he indeed does love Jesus. And three times, the risen Lord asks Peter to "feed my sheep." Pass the love on, because it doesn't exist unless it is given away.

On this Easter Sunday we celebrate the Resurrection, which is the gift of a divine love that cannot be shut down by death. Or by fear or anger or disappointment or grief. This enormous gift of love has been given to us.

And we are challenged to pass it on. Otherwise, it doesn't really exist.

Parish News

Flooding in the southeast corner classroom this winter brought a prolonged battle to repair a drainage problem, but everything is sorted now. Bill Riley led the team that resolved the situation, documenting the process with photos.





"I sent so many in order to explain what the 'white thing' was. If you look at the pictures you can see the white 5-gallon buckets stacked in a hole. The 'white thing' is a lid that I placed over the top bucket to keep dirt from falling into the buckets [and] to protect the sump pump that is located in the buckets."

Right: Steve Thomas dumping gravel into the trench. Any water draining into that area will settle towards the buckets which have holes drilled in them so water can move from the gravel to the space inside the buckets. When water reaches a certain level the sump pump automatically starts pumping it out and into the existing drain line. This is the



same drain line that gets runoff from the roof of the Parish Hall and also from two downspouts attached to the Rectory.

Special thanks to Sue Phelps and John Trotogatt of Holy Cross who were involved in the process and offered many suggestions. The corner room will be used by Holy Cross in the future.

Below: Bob Spielman drilling the hole through the block wall. We ran an electrical cord through that hole and attached it to the sump pump. The other end of the cord plugs into a special electrical outlet that will trip if anything goes wrong.



Bill applied two coats of latex battleship gray paint on top of two coats of white sealer paint on the floor. Holy Cross personnel plan to purchase rugs to put on the floor after they paint over the mural on the east wall. As soon as it is decided between Sue Phelps and Holy Cross what furniture will be placed in the room, Bob will install covers over the electrical wire to the sump pump to attach the wire to the wall so it won't be left hanging. The room is ready to be turned over to Holy Cross now.
