



Pastor Gail's Ponderings

From Matthew's Gospel we read, "So they (the women) left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples."

Matthew 28:8

It was not possible to just walk away from the empty tomb—to stroll along that first Easter Sunday morning as though languishing in dreamy contentment. These women had a startling awareness of their world being turned upside down. They saw what God was doing. What they saw changed everything. Nothing could go on as before. The vision of the future was breaking into the present. Jesus was alive!!!

Nothing is so unstoppable as a clear and compelling vision. Visions of what can be have inspired revolutions and religions. Clear and compelling visions create community and move us to a great persistence and selflessness. People who have a vision have a purpose that beckons them out of sleep in the morning, that designs their priorities for every part of their day, and that gives them gratitude at the close of the day. The vision of what can be and will be is what really matters.

God has a vision for us. It is as if God created each human being with an empty space in their heart that can only be filled by God. We may try to fill that space with something else—possessions or people, food or television, work

or hobbies, too much alcohol or too much anything! But none of these fills that Godshaped hole. Only faith in the living Triune God can fill that deep need. 

Final results for the February collection of donated food for the Roseburg Food Project are in: 73 Neighborhood Coordinators collected 12,087 pounds of food from 750 Food Project donors. Thank you to all those who donated food in the green grocery bags and helped with the collection of the green bags.

The next collection of green bags for the Roseburg Food Project will be **Saturday**, **April 10**.

Emergency food service is the major focus of FISH. The Food Pantry is one of the first food banks in Oregon designed to allow low-income folks to choose the groceries most appropriate for their families. The Pantry is open for direct client services 4 days per week and serves any Douglas County residents.

If you need to pick up food for someone who is unable to get to the Pantry you must bring a signed Authorization Form. Please print the Authorization Form, available on the website at www.fishofroseburg.org/services.php

and have them fill it out and sign it. You must bring the signed form with you to pick up food for them.

Welcome, Elona!

St. George has a new organist, Elona Wong.



Born in Los Angeles, Elona grew up in Santa Monica. She began learning to play the piano at age 6, given lessons by the choir director of her Baptist church. But she always knew she wanted to live in the country, so in 1988 she and Shannon, her young daughter, came to Oregon. She chose Seal Rock because she was sure she would always want to live by the ocean.

After a couple of years there, Elona realized that the Santa Monica beach weather was much kinder than that on the Oregon coast, so she shifted her focus. She moved to Eugene, where she became a licensed massage therapist and got her Bachelor's in Linguistics from the University of Oregon. But Eugene was not where she wanted to be, and when another massage therapist she had known for years told her she was selling her place in Days Creek, Elona went to see it and fell in love.

In 1997 they moved to the 40-acre property with orchards and a creek. One of Elona's Eugene friends knew a family with two teenage daughters in Days Creek, and after introductions were made, Shannon had a new best friend before school even started.

That same year Elona opened her business, Elona's Circle of Healing Arts, in Canyonville. It is a center dedicated to natural healing and is currently offering massage therapy. Elona is also a licensed wildlife rehabilitator with Umpqua Wildlife Rescue, mainly working with orphaned baby birds and squirrels and injured songbirds and small mammals.

Elona began to study the organ about four years ago. For two years she commuted weekly from Days Creek to Eugene for lessons with Dr. Barbara Baird at the U of O.

During her studies, Elona discovered a weekly radio program called Pipedreams, which explores the art of the pipe organ. She went on a tour of European organs that they sponsored and had a wonderful time. "I found my tribe!" she said.

A series of phone calls between Pete Benham, Dr. Jason Heald, and Donna Spicer brought Elona's attention to St. George's. She visited us and accepted the position of organist/pianist. She started March 14 and is doing an amazing job.

Elona is grandmother to Emmalyn and Calvin. Shannon met her husband-to-be, Mark Schneider, while attending Milo Academy as a day student. They live in Portland.


