## **Everyday Adventures: Just How Big Is the Concept of Evangelism?**

Growing up, I learned about evangelism and came to understand it as bringing people to the Christian faith who previously had not had the benefit of a formal introduction to our God. That meant to me that I needed to find those "unchurched" souls and somehow convince them that I knew what was best for them. And, it also meant that evangelism had nothing to do with people I met along the way who already were either nominally Christian or actively attended church.

In the last few years, I have come to believe that evangelism also encompasses assisting others to develop a deeper and closer relationship with Christ than what they might have thought possible. I have been the recipient of evangelistic outreach when I have been invited to attend a particular church, to become a member of church groups, to participate in formation programs and outreach service or events. In turn, most recently I have invited others I meet at work or elsewhere to come to my parish's daily Eucharist, to stay for coffee and conversation after our Saturday morning Eucharist service, and by sharing what I know about The Episcopal Church with people coming from other denominations.

... I believe that I am evangelizing when I am able to create the opportunity or environment in which someone wants to explore their faith in a more robust way than they felt able to do in the past. I feel like it is all our responsibility to welcome anyone who might consider entering an Episcopal Church— without judgment about who they love, what ethnic and gender category they find themselves part of, their economic status or how much or how little they know about what is in the Bible. In this, we help them to become closer to Christ.

#### **Spotlight on Jewell Gates**

Jewell Black was born on Dec. 19, 1928, in Redmond, Oregon. Her parents had a sheep ranch in nearby Ashwood (between Madras and Prineville), now a ghost town.



Jewell at age 9 with her brother, Stanton. He was tragically killed in an auto accident when he was 19. Jewell named her first son after him.

After her parents divorced, Jewell went to live in Bend. Trinity Episcopal Church was adjacent to the high school Jewell attended and had a very active youth group. Although her family was 1st Christian, they were not unhappy when she became an Episcopalian.

Jewell graduated from Eastern Oregon College (now University) in La Grande with a degree in public relations. She worked for West Coast Telephone Company and it was there in La Grande that she met her future husband. Dick Gates was working on his master's degree in special education at the University of Oregon. They married in December of 1949 in La Grande.

Dick's first job was in La Grande, where their son Stanton was born. Dick took the position of special education director in Roseburg, where they lived from 1953-1956. Their son Jeffrey was born in Roseburg.

After Roseburg the family moved first to Cedar Hills, near Portland, where their daughter, Michelle, was born, and then to Oregon City. But Dick was asked to go to Astoria to start the first Job Corps in the U.S. Jewell says, "You can imagine the surprise of the urban kids from Back East when they arrived in Oregon!" Jewell noted that Grace Episcopal in Astoria is one of their favorite churches.

Dick's special education jobs took him across the country. They moved to New Jersey ("like another world") and then to Pennsylvania, where he worked in the main office of Philco-Ford. Besides producing appliances and radios, Philco did lots of government contracts and vocational training. Jewell became an estimator for Greyhound National Moving Company. It was her job to look at someone's belongings and decide how much room was needed in the truck. She got very good at it.

Dick found he preferred not to be in the main office, so he went to an Indian school in Madera, CA, and then on to Montana where he trained whole rural families who no longer had a way to make a living on small farms.

#### Spotlight on Jewell Gates, cont.

The Gates family returned to Roseburg in 1974. Dick had always been interested in community colleges and was delighted to become Director of Developmental Education Programs at UCC. He was instrumental in getting the Woolley Center going and he landed the Job Corps contract for the college. He stayed at UCC some 20 years before retiring.



Jewell went into real estate for about 15 years until Dick fell ill. He died in 2001. At one time they owned 20 acres out in Melrose, which included a small vineyard.

Jewell's son Stanton lives in the Bend/ Redmond area, returning to his mother's High Desert roots. He is a master mechanic and has become an expert on antique guns as well. Her son Jeffrey was working on his doctorate in public health at Columbia University in New York, but sadly, he died before he could finish his degree. Daughter Michelle is employed in the finance section of the University of Arizona in Tucson.

Always active in church life, Jewell is a mainstay of both ECW and the Altar Guild. She also counts the St. George money intake once a month.

Jewell is a blessing to St. George's—a jewel in the crown of our church.



#### Financial Report by Kathy Glockner

From the report for June, we are doing well so far. Year to date, our pledges are at **\$35,393.00**. Our year-to-date budget is **\$29,763.00**.

Some people paid the full amount of their pledge at the beginning of the year, so as the year progresses, the difference between will decrease. On the other hand, some people give more than their pledged amount, but it gets put under pledges if you are a pledging member. The Rev. Boston and our wonderful office staff have kept expenses to a minimum. Year-to-date expenses are **\$44,744.04**. Our budgeted year-to-date amount was **\$52,952.14**.

That leaves us in the black by \$15,969.94.

Good work, team! Keep it up.

I semi-jokingly asked if this included physical work and she said it did. After visiting in the Parish Hall she helped me load about 30 partially filled bags of dirt in the back of my pickup.



Despite using a cane to help her walk (she is currently awaiting hip surgery), she had no trouble lifting the bags and it was a tremendous help to me both from a physical standpoint and also morale point of having someone to work with. I said I would be back at 10:00 on Monday and when I got there at 9:30 she was there waiting for me. Not only capable but most certainly eager. We hope to finish digging for the foundation of our new Columbarium on Tuesday.



Mari-Jo was born on Oahu, Hawaii in 1962 and was adopted at age two months by William Remington Miles, who went on to retire from the Marine Corps, and his wife Lola Lee Bullard who retired from the U.S. Navy. Mari-Jo graduated from Amador County High School in California in 1978 and the following year the family moved to Roseburg. Her father worked for many years as a volunteer for CASA with their juvenile rehabilitation program and her mother was an RN at the Roseburg VA Hospital until she retired.

Mari-Jo completed two years of nursing school and has worked as a caretaker. She has also worked as a waitress and in fast food restaurants and in construction and gardening. She is currently receiving some financial support due to her disability which helps pay her rent but is looking for work to pay for her food. She does have a driver's license but does not own a car. She most assuredly has my recommendation.
