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#### **Rector's Letter**

Dear Friends,

As you read this, Advent has arrived and Christmas is coming. It is a time of promise, of gratitude, of hope, and, often, also a time of sorrow. Some churches have a "Blue Christmas" service in late Advent, a service for those who approach the holidays bearing the sorrows of losses and disappointments, and for those who want to support them. Every Christian gathering has some element of sorrow. We look for that which is not yet fully present, has not fully arrived, the day when all the tears are wiped from our eyes, and we are fully at peace and joy with God, with our neighbors, and with ourselves. That is a long sentence. You might want to read it again.

We are the Church. Not the whole Church, but still the Church of Jesus Christ, present here and now. We are bearers of hope and love. We are messengers of the promises of God. Paul writes that all the promises of God are fulfilled in Jesus. We look to Jesus, the Babe of Bethlehem, the Man of Galilee, the Healer, the Teacher, the Forgiver, the Man of Sorrows, the perfect sacrifice, the promised Messiah, the resurrected King, the Lord of Life, the merciful Judge, the Bread of Heaven, our Savior and our Friend, our Companion and our God. Not only do we look to Jesus, but we try to bring others with us to look as well. We want to share the Good News of God's love.

When I was young, Advent and Christmas were mostly about presents, giving them and getting them. (Actually, when I was young I had never heard of Advent . . . it was all Christmas.) At the age of 10 I came to realize that the great gift is Jesus, a faith I learned, and expressed, through our family nativity scene. At that same age I began to learn to extend Christmas by caroling at hospitals and gathering food for the poor. Not that I didn't still like the presents. At my present age, the presents don't matter much, but the nativity scenes and feeding the hungry and singing to shut-ins are still important to me. Pam and I have at least a dozen nativity scenes, including the one from my childhood.

This will be my second Christmas at St. George's. The choir and altar guild are preparing. Presents for poor children are being bought and wrapped. I don't remember a nativity scene from last year. (Someone make sure there is one, or more, this year, please.) I look forward to sharing the beauty of Christmas Eve with you and with many guests. We will pray for peace in a world that needs more of it, pray for love to grow, pray for good lives for ourselves and all the world. And we will do so in the conviction that the One whose birth we celebrate is indeed our Savior and King, our Brother and our Lord.

#### **FISH Report**

The fall food drive for the FISH of Roseburg was held Saturday, October 29th, at local Roseburg grocery stores. Several pallets of food totaling 4,390 pounds and \$498 in cash were collected. St. George volunteers worked at Sherm's Thunderbird.

The October Roseburg Food Project brought in an October record of 10,067 pounds of food from 641 donors coordinated by 70 neighborhood coordinators. The next RFP pick up day is Saturday, December 10.

### **Cathedrals of the World**

#### St. Thomas Cathedral Mumbai, India



St. Thomas Cathedral, Mumbai, India, is the Anglican cathedral church of the Diocese of Mumbai of the Church of North India and is located in the historic center of Mumbai. It was named in honor of St. Thomas, who was the apostle to India and who introduced Christianity to that part of India.

The foundation stone was laid in 1676 but then further work was discontinued for many years and the church was only finally built and consecrated on Christmas Day 1718. It was the first Anglican church in what was then Bombay and was built in the Neo-Classic and Neo-Gothic styles and was modelled after St. Thomas Cathedral in Belfast, Northern Ireland.

The reason for building the church was in an effort to improve the moral standards of the growing British population and it was within the walls of the fortified British settlement, which was built by the East India Company to protect their commercial interests.

In order to provide choristers for the cathedral, the Cathedral and John Cannon School was created and this body is now the administration for the cathedral. The church was consecrated as a cathedral in 1837, at the same time as the appointment of the first Bishop of Bombay. Soon after, the tower and clock were added and then a major renovation was completed in 1865.

The roof was made "cannon-ball proof" but today parts have been replaced by cement slabs. The peaceful cemetery, with its many elaborate headstones, contains graves of generals, clerks, and young maids, all far from their homes in Great Britain.



The cathedral was originally divided into sections for different classes of society, including one for "Inferior Women."




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Updated insert of the traditional Birthday Prayer for the pew copies of the BCP. The prayer now reads more realistically: raise them up *when*, not *if*, they fall.
