

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Rector's Letter

Dear friends,

We are now into Advent, the season of preparation for the coming of the Lord Jesus. We will be celebrating his coming as the newborn son of Mary. We will anticipate his coming again. Most of all, I hope we can contemplate the ways Jesus has come to us throughout our lives, and still comes.

Christians tend to have a favorite image of God, who is beyond image. Most often it is one of the Persons of the Holy Trinity: Father, Son, or Holy Spirit. Sometimes we rely on others in whom we experience God: the Blessed Virgin Mary, old Father Smith who prepared me for confirmation, a parent, a hero, a friend. Beyond the images is God, God incomprehensible, God who loves us in so many ways.

In high school I read *The Cloister and the Hearth* by Charles Reade. A character in the novel often says, "*Courage, mon ami, le diable est mort! Take heart, my friend, the devil is dead!*" I found that a comforting thought when I was seventeen. I am seventy now, and I still do. Not that the devil is not still a problem, but his end was determined in the incarnation, death, and resurrection of Jesus. As we sing at Easter, "The strife is o'er, the battle won"

So, we need not live in fear. And yet, so many of us do. (I do not mean prudence, which is wise.)

Fear sells. It sells locks and walls, knives and guns, politicians and insurance policies. People will lie, steal, and hoard because they are fearful, afraid of not having enough, not being secure enough. Worst of all, fear keeps us away from other people, especially people who are different. The Apostle John wrote, "Perfect love casts out fear." (1 John 4:18)

As a pastor, part of my work is to help people who are living in fear to find freedom and hope. I am called to remind all that, "God is good, all the time."

We are in a new church year. The featured Gospel is Mark. Things move fast in Mark, often "immediately." He eagerly shares the good news of Jesus, the Messiah. Let us all move quickly to freedom: freedom from fear, freedom to love, freedom to give, freedom to serve. We can do it because God is good, all the time.

It is a joy to be your priest. I will be happy for the priest you call, hopefully in the coming year. He or she will blessed to share with you in the work of Christ.

Vestry Nominations for 2018

Faithfully attend parish functions and worship services.

Encourage and support parish members in mutual ministry.

Be willing to work with other members of the Vestry.

On November 5, the article "Two Douglas County Men Will Be Honored for Service to the Masons and the Community" showcased parishioner David Jackson. The Scottish Rite of Freemasonry Fraternity bestowed on him the 33rd Degree Inspectors General Honorary award for exceptional service to the Rite and to Freemasonry and to the community. David said that in his 39 years with the organization there was only one other person who ever attained the 33rd degree award.

Larry Dobson's crew started reroofing our Parish Hall on October 23. By Sunday, November 5, most of the work had been completed. It can be noted that the edge of the new rolled roofing is slid up under the lower edge of the shingles on the main church roof so there is no way any moisture can get under the new roofing. Also, if any water should puddle on the new flat roof, it can not percolate through the new roofing. A metal flange is placed along all edges. Thank you to the anonymous donor who contributed more than 50% of the cost.

Lessons & Carols

Sunday, December 31, 2017 at 10:00

Every year at St. George's our first Sunday of Christmas service is that of Lessons and Carols. This Anglican custom dates back to 1878, when the Royal Cornwall Gazette reported that the choir of Truro Cathedral would sing a service of carols at 10:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve. (You may remember that Doug Holloway wrote an article on Truro Cathedral for the August 2017 *Dragon Scoop*.)

The Choir of the Cathedral will sing a number of carols in the Cathedral on Christmas Eve, the service commencing at 10pm. We understand that this is at the wish of many of the leading parishioners and others. A like service has been instituted in other cathedral and large towns, and has been much appreciated. It is the intention of the choir to no longer continue the custom of singing carols at the residences of members of the congregation.

Two years later, Edward White Benson, Bishop of Truro who later became Archbishop of Canterbury, formalized the service with Nine Lessons for use on Christmas Eve 1880. The first service took place in the temporary wooden structure serving as his cathedral while the new cathedral was being built. Over 400 people attended this first service. There is an oft-repeated myth that the purpose of the service was to keep men out of the pubs.

The service has subsequently been in continuous use (with modifications) in Truro since 1880. In December 2013 Truro Cathedral staged a reconstruction of the original 1880 Nine Lessons with Carols Service which was attended by an audience of over 1,500 people.
