Rev. Matt's Pastoral Letter

I'm sitting in front of our gas fireplace on a rainy Monday morning when this verse from Exodus pops up. For context ... the Hebrew People are between a rock and a hard place. The Egyptian Army is advancing and there is this big body of water in front of them. And Moses speaks

..

"Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the Lord's salvation, which He will accomplish for you today; for the Egyptians you see today, you will never see again.

The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still.

(Ex. 14:13-14)

Something about verse 14 (in bold) struck a chord with me. Why?

Advent is the strange and inconvenient Church Season where we pay particular attention to the whys, the longings of our heart, and the sighs that are too deep for words. Not only ours but the sighs of the world we live in as well. We long for a Savior to come who will release us from our bondage and guide us ... who will make Psalm 23 tangible. We long for a shepherd. We long for "God with us!"





- ✓ A lay member in good standing.
- \checkmark Eighteen (18) or more years of age.
- ✓ Not a member of the household of a current Vestry member.
- ✓ Be willing to create more active involvements from parish members who are not Vestry members.
- ✓ Faithfully attend parish functions, worship services.
- ✓ Encourage and support parish members in mutual ministry.
- ✓ Be willing to work with other members of the Vestry.


Bishop Charleston's Wisdom
