Pastoral Letter

"In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, Magi from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born King of the Jews? For we have observed His star at its rising and have come to pay Him homage."

(St. Matthew 2: 1-2)

We are a species created to move and explore. It is in our makeup, our DNA. This reality of our existence, it seems, is from our very beginning when cells divide, expand, regroup, and grow. The time arrives and the womb can no longer keep us. There is something else out there ... Birth. Our very bodies and minds sense the rhythm and reject the confines. From baby clothes to toddlers. From Gerber's mash to solids. From cute bubbles to words and questions. We escape the crib, crawl, and explore the room, then the house. We walk and suddenly the backyard beckons. And so, the journey, the discovery, the birth, begins anew.

Humanity is at its best, we are never more human, more ourselves than when we listen to this ancient call. Herman Melville in his book *Moby Dick* summarized this basic element of us. He wrote, "I am tormented with an irresistible itch for things remote. I love to sail forbidden seas.

And land on barbarous coasts." How small would we be, what amazing things would we miss, if we were simply content to stay within the confines of our self-imposed boundaries?

The Magi are curious prophets of the Faith and reveal, I believe, what it means, what it looks like, to heed the call of birth.

We know so little of them and their brief appearance gets lost within the Christmas story, regulated to gift giving and heard no more. But WHAT an affront to sedentary faith! They left more than their Homeland. They left the familiar, pulled into mystery by a star that spoke, if you will, with the siren song of "follow me." And their journey, their birth, leads them to Emmanuel, God with us.

For all the promises that Christmas presents us, this, to me, is the most exciting. It tells us not to be afraid. It calls us to never stop exploring the world around you, the mind inside of you, and the heart within you. I wonder ... what new Bethlehems will the Newborn King beckon you towards in the days to come?

The Preacher & The Teacher

Excerpts from 1954

St. George's was always a cosmopolitan parish, with people from all walks of life rubbing shoulders happily with one another. It was a really catholic communion rail, with truck drivers, teachers and generals kneeling alongside each other in their common worship of God.

Also, on January 28, 1954 I met with Fred and Shirley Bernau. They were anxious for us to continue our missionary expansion. Now that we had Fr. Lauren McReynolds in the field at Myrtle Creek and Riddle, the Bernaus suggested we look toward Sutherlin. They wanted to revive the defunct Church of the Holy Spirit, which had been lost as the result of a bank failure, mortgage foreclosure, and suicide of the Church treasurer (who was also the bank manager) during the Great Depression. There had been no services held there for 17 or 18 years, and our old Church building was being used as the "shop" by the Sutherlin High School. It was agreed that if enough interest could be raised to guarantee an attendance of at least 12 to 15 people on a Sunday evening, I would agree to start holding services there.

Fred and Shirley spent every Sunday afternoon and evening during February and March, calling on former members of the Episcopal congregation there, and on others who they thought might be interested, with the result that on the last Sunday in March 1954, we held the first service for the resurrected Church of the Holy Spirit. Evening Prayer was held in the American Legion Hall with attendance of 52!


While our attendance dropped off slightly from the initial 52, it ran generally in the 40s and efforts were soon under way to build us a new Church building of our own, rather than having to sweep out beer bottles and trash from the Legion Hall every week after the lady wrestlers had performed there on Saturday night.

It was in March of 1954 that Pat Mayo, choir member, spearheaded a fund drive to buy a pipe organ, which culminated in the purchase [the next year] of a six-rank Moeller pipe organ. (*They were currently using an old two-manual reed organ.*) Part of the funds came from the sale of a grand piano left to the parish by Minnie Ritter in her will. Her widower, Merrill, threatened to sue the parish to back "his" piano, but the daughter-in-law and Merrill's own lawyer all sided with St. George's, and the storm blew over. The piano was sold to the Methodist Church for use in their worship services, and the proceeds provided the down payment to buy our pipe organ.

At the Diocesan Convention in April, Bishop Dagwell appointed me Dean of the Southern Convocation. . . . Five days later, another extremely successful parish Carnival was held, and on that next Thursday, May 11, 1954, Bishop Dagwell confirmed a class of 38, the largest in the history of the parish. The following night he confirmed eight at Ascension, Riddle for that congregation and for the new mission of St. Anne's in Myrtle Creek. Then, on Sunday the 16th, we rented a school bus and filled it, plus two cars with kids for the Deanery Mite Box presentation service at St. Luke's Grants Pass.

That same month of May, Frances Micelli held a fabulous "tea" at her luxurious home for our Altar Guild, and I played music on a borrowed Baldwin electronic organ. We had both the well to do, and the poor, all working together side by side.

a Quaker household and learned to sew from her great-aunt.


The Umpqua Valley Stamp Club meets monthly every 3rd Monday except for June and December.
