<u>Ordinary Time</u>

After Pentecost and after
Epiphany come long stretches of the lil ordinary not such as Christmas and Easter. But the season is called ordinary not because it is mundane, but because the word derives from "ordinal," remember the word derives

An essay by Melody Wilson Shobe called *No "Ordinary" Time* has a wonderful description of this green season:

The very fact that the church has a time called "Ordinary" is a profound theological statement. It is a reminder of the presence of God in and through the most mundane and ordinary seasons of our lives. God is not only on the mountaintop or in the valley, but walking alongside each of us when the flat road stretches interminably into the horizon.

In fact, the gospel reading for one of the first Sundays in ordinary time reminds us of this very fact. In Matthew 6:24-34, Jesus tells us to remember the birds of the air and the lilies of the field. They are ordinary and seemingly insignificant parts of the natural world, small and unimportant compared to us. And yet God remembers and cares for each of them.

It is a reminder that when God came and lived among us in the person of Jesus Christ, he experienced the same ordinary reality that we all experience. And that God, in Christ, offered us the opportunity to transform the most ordinary, mundane experiences into extraordinary events infused with the presence of God. God is there, present in the midst of the ordinary, just waiting for us to recognize it.



Rueben James Needs a New Home


Rueben James is an affectionate Tuxedo domestic shorthair.

Fir Grove School Supply Project

Now that Rose School has closed, Fir Grove Elementary students will be the recipients of St. George school supply donations. Please consider choosing one or more items from the following list:

- 3-ring binders
- School boxes (small size)
- Back packs (big enough to accommodate a binder and coat)
- Zippered pouches (for notebooks)
- No. 2 pencils (Ticonderoga and Dixon are best)
- Large boxes of Kleenex
- Colored pencils (Crayola brand works best)
- Package of fine-tip washable markers
- Package of pencil-top erasers
- Box of crayons (at least 24-count)
- Tab dividers for notebook
- Glue sticks (large)
- Ream of colored Xerox paper
- Scissors
- Children's socks
- Children's underwear
- Clorox wipes
- Lysol wipes

Cathedrals of the World

Salisbury Cathedral Salisbury, England

This cathedral is the mother church of the Diocese of Salisbury and the seat of the Bishop of Salisbury.



Work was started on the main body of the cathedral in 1220 and completed in 1258—only 38 years—although other parts of the building were not completed until 1280. The spire, which is the tallest church spire in the United Kingdom at 404 feet, was not completed until 1320. Even

today the land around that part of the city is still farmland and the spire can be seen from many miles away. However, since the church was built on marshland, over the centuries many buttresses, bracing arches and anchor irons have been added to prevent the spire from falling down.

The church contains the world's oldest working clock, although from 1884 until 1956 this clock was not in working order.

The cathedral has one of only four original copies of the Magna Carta—which was signed in 1215—due to the fact that an official who was responsible for distributing this document after the signing at Runnymede retained one and later became a canon at Salisbury whilst supervising the building of the church.

Although the cathedral lacks a ring of bells, it does strike the time every 15 minutes with bells. The current organ was built in 1877 and a faithful restoration was carried out on the site in 1916. There is both a boys' choir and a girls' choir, which sing at daily Evensong, Sunday Matins, and Eucharist services.
