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Rector's Letter

Dear friends,

I am writing this on Friday morning, the day after the British voted, by a narrow margin, to leave the European Union. As a lifelong student of international affairs, this is very depressing. Not the end of the world, certainly, but a setback for values that can be traced back to the not-so-simple law that we are to love our neighbors as ourselves.

I won't go any deeper into that. It's complicated. But so is much of life. One complication that faces us at St. George's is having a beautiful old building in a neighborhood that is, to put it gently, rundown. That is the case for many and complex reasons. We can ignore it. We might possibly flee it. Or we can do what we can do to make it better. We cannot fix it ourselves, but we can make it better. We are off to a good start by keeping the building and grounds looking good. I have been impressed with the great job a talented group of members do in maintaining the building and grounds. Do thank them.

The ECW is looking at other ways to love our neighbors, especially some of the women who find themselves living precariously with the help of Samaritan House and Safe Haven. A couple of weeks ago I met with the leadership of both places and some interesting ideas were hatched. The leaders of Safe Haven, a home for women expecting or caring for babies, remember St. George's Episcopal Church as their founder! Wow! Good for us! More on all that will be coming from Juliana Marez.

A parish church plays many roles. Being a good neighbor is one. Being a place apart from the neighborhood is another. St. George's is a place of shelter and beauty, a space for healing and comfort, a school for followers of Jesus Christ, a community of friends, an outpost for gospel evangelism, and a center for worship of the living God in the tradition of Anglicanism. Pastors of other parts of Christianity have told me many time how grateful they are for the witness of their local Episcopal Church. Our grounding in scripture and historical Christianity, in sacramental worship and daily prayer, is widely valued.

Thank you for all of your faithful service. Please prayerfully consider who you know that might be blessed by joining us. Some are former members, or have been members of Episcopal churches elsewhere. Some used to attend other kinds of churches. Some have hardly even visited a church. Yet there are, I know, quite a few people in Roseburg that would be drawn to St. George's and the Episcopal Church. In the fall I am planning to have a number of Sundays that might be particularly good times to bring friends to church. But any time might be the right time. Just think and pray, talk with friends, and then invite as you feel called.

When you are travelling, make a point to seek out a place to worship each Sunday. Then bring back a bulletin. We will post them in the Parish Hall.

Watch for some variety and some adjustments on Sunday mornings during the summer. Feedback is welcome.

I am glad to be your priest.

The FISH of Roseburg needs you!



Gifts of the Holy Spirit Word Search



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

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
You can tell you are in an Episcopal church when

Home: the word evokes many thoughts and feelings. Each year at least one or more of the children I work with will "go home."



I remember one street kid telling me his first morning in the shelter it hit him that he was home, in a comfortable safe bed, with a full belly and rested. This year was no exception. Adverse childhood experiences affect a child for a lifetime. Research tells us that these experiences change the brain and physiology of the child. The cascade of adrenalin, cortisol, and other fight-or-flight hormones creates the changes. The immune system is weakened and healing is compromised. It's hard to measure what it does to the soul, but new research on moral trauma may give us those answers.

Comforting the parents and survivors of those taken too young is more about listening than talking. It's not fair. It's not ok. It's not fixable. The good news is that this life is just a brief stop on the way to eternity. This week I walked with a mother whose child was "going home" with cancer. I told her she was midwife to an angel. Our faith gives us the answer and makes it all fair. We will see her again radiant and joyful as ever she was. This life tempers our souls for the next.

Cathedrals of the World

St. John the Baptist Buenos Aires, Argentina

The Anglican Cathedral of St. John the Baptist in Buenos Aires, Argentina, is the Mother Church of the Diocese of Argentina and is where the Diocesan Bishop has his seat of honor.

Construction started in 1830 and was completed in record time in 1831. It is the oldest non-Catholic building in South America.

The site was originally a cemetery of a convent of friars and was donated by the then ruler of Argentina. It was built with the aid of a generous subsidy by the British Government after a treaty was signed between Great Britain and Argentina in 1825. This treaty granted tolerance for the religion of British subjects resident in the country.




British settlers had been arriving in Argentina since 1806. Originally the settlers were businessmen and traders but later richer English families bought land, founded banks, and developed an extensive import and export trade.

From then until the present day and in the midst of numerous civil wars and conflicts the church has maintained a continuous presence and ministry.



Over the years numerous changes have occurred to the fabric of the building. These include the addition of a chancel and the construction of choir stalls, canon stalls, and a Bishop's throne. An excellent organ was donated in the early 1900s and is still in use today. Also the windows have been filled with magnificent stained glass.


