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A Tale of Enchantment in the Enchantment Lakes Wilderness Area by Pastor Gail

While David and I were in Spokane in early June for his doctors' and dentist's appointments, I had an incredible adventure. We flew to Spokane on June 4 and were planning to stay until June 12, so we could drive back to Roseburg for Sunday's Holy Trinity Sunday. The first two days in Spokane were fun, but not overly eventful. On Friday and Saturday nights, we were invited to several friends' homes for "socially-distanced gatherings" in their backyards. As we all commented, it's been such a long time since we've had a chance to gather, to talk meaningfully, and to look into our futures.

Sunday morning, we had plans to attend an "online" church service and were just having breakfast when a text message (of rather urgent nature) came from my friend, Cheryl.

"Heidi (that's my hiking or trail name), what are you doing from Monday-Thursday? I have been able to get a permit (and you know how these are very difficult to obtain) for a three-night backpack in the Enchantment Lakes Wilderness Area. My sister was planning to come from CA, but just last night she backed out, not wanting to travel that far. Do you want to take her place on this short-notice backpack?"

Well, I did not text her back immediately. But I did begin talking to David about it. We decided that it would be a great time for me and he was fine with being at our home in Spokane Valley with just our cat!

Cheryl picked me up the next morning. I had hurriedly packed for the backpack. We drove across the state to Leavenworth, laughing and singing as we went. We stopped at the Ranger Station to get last-minute instructions and meet her other two friends from her church and headed into the wild!

It was rainy when we hiked the five miles into Eightmile Lake. The clouds cleared long enough for us to pitch our tents. Then the rain stopped and we emerged to a glorious scene. We were on the edge of a beautiful lake that had steep slopes on two sides and gentle slopes down to the lake on the other sides. Cheryl and her other friends were all fly fishers so they had a great time tempting the fish, but no strikes. When you backpack you need to eat extra calories, so after dinner we feasted on "Reese's Peanut Butter Cup" s'mores!

The next morning after breakfast, we left our tents set up and hiked another five miles over to Caroline Lake. It was beautiful, but there was lots of snow as the trail dropped down to the alpine lake, so we stayed at the top and had a great lunch while watching the birds soar. Back at our camp, the fisherpeople fished and I thought about the richness of God's creation. Psalm 121 has always been a favorite: "I lift up my eyes to the hills" Read it if you have time.

We headed over to our next trail to Colchuck Lake. This was the most arduous of the hikes and we all felt VERY glad when we got to the lake. That's why the big grins on our faces!
