

Parish News

The Episcopal Church is becoming more careful about protecting the rights of parishioners. To that end parents/guardians will be asked to sign a media release form in the near future allowing photos of their children in the newsletter or on Facebook. And of course anyone can opt out of having their own picture there.

Also, the question has arisen as to whether registered sex offenders may attend services here. With the Diocese's guidance, the Vestry decided on this:

St. George Episcopal Church may allow a person known to be a sexual offender to remain or become a member of the congregation but they must adhere to specific guidelines. However, first check with the offender's probation/parole officer for any restrictions regarding attending services or other functions where children are present. Ask the probation/parole officer to put any restrictions in writing. If restrictions don't prohibit participation, implement the following four guidelines.

- 1. A known sexual offender cannot participate in any of the child or youth programs in any way.
- 2. A known sexual offender can only participate in a predetermined service each week; and
- 3. A known sexual offender must report in and be assigned to an escort who will accompany him or her at all times.
- 4. The identity of the sexual offender will be disclosed to the Vestry.

Please note that there are **NO** registered sex offenders in our congregation at this time. This came from a question that was asked, and the Vestry decided it was best to have a proactive policy in place.

The Preacher & The Teacher

Fr. Tyson and Carolyn planned to go to England in the summer to study at Canterbury Cathedral.

[Feb. 7] Sunday attendance was down at both 9:30 and 11—maybe a rebellion against the new liturgy? That evening we had a "Folk Mass" with Joe presiding with 85 there but only 35 received communion. I noted that "there were many Unitarians there." Albert and Thelma Sayers dropped by to discuss summer plans; Thelma was planning on going with us to Europe.

During Lent we had potlucks on Sunday night with movies I got from our national Church headquarters. Mid-week communions continued all year... On Saturday we had the wedding for Terry Curis and Leslie Wimberly with reception afterwards at the Country club. "Much comment—some humorous, some angry—about long-haired youth and short-short skirted girls" (No comment!)

Tuesday Morning, June 16 Thelma, Caroline and I boarded the Trailways bus at 8 for Sea-Tac airport, arriving on schedule at 11 P.M. We were on our way!! We left at 1 A.M on the Transavia Holland, a Boeing 707, flying north to the Arctic Ocean, then across Canada, Greenland, Iceland, Scotland, and arriving at the Schiphol airport at 7 A.M. where we got our Avis rental car (which we had booked ahead—other passengers were told there were no cars available!). "After getting lost some we found our Belga Hotel at 11 Hartenstrast. Then Thelma, Caroline and I walked around that evening, getting lost again!" But we were in Holland.

Thursday, Friday and part of Saturday we spent in Amsterdam. We took a ride in a canal boat, ate lunch in a little Italian café, and walked miles—seeing "mini skirts galore (they hadn't got to the United states yet) prostitutes and sex shops." Finally we got our car and drove to Zandvoort where we spent two hours eating supper.

All of a sudden we were in Europe—in historic Holland, visiting ancient towns like Alkmaar, the cheese market—and Edam, Volendam, Monnikendam and Markham, with many people dressed in "native" attire for us tourists. And supper at a Chinese-Indonesian restaurant in "traditional" Holland.

On Saturday we said goodbye to Mr. and Mrs. Loesberg, left Amsterdam and drove to Utrecht—scene of several historic treaties—and on to Gent, where we stayed at a "pension" (rather like our bed-and-breakfast places.) Dinner at a Flemish restaurant. The language in this part of the country is Flemish—but most of them understand English. We were impressed by the ancient town: four great churches and two castles right in the center of town. However, a railroad was located just behind our bedroom and made sleep a bit interrupted.

Sunday we ate breakfast at "pension Azalea," took Thelma to the R.R. station where she bought a ticket to Stuttgart, and we said goodbye. She was to meet Albert there where he had just bought a new Mercedes to drive around Europe and bring back to the United State as a "used car," thus saving oodles of money. Then Caroline and I went to Matins at St. John Anglican Church ("Episcopal") and visited the ancient cathedral, much impressed. Leaving the Flemish area we drove to Dunkirk where the big Allied retreat crossed the Channel and escaped the advancing Nazi armies.



Cathedrals of the World by Doug Holloway

St. Andrew's Cathedral, Sydney, Australia

St. Andrew's Cathedral is the cathedral church of the Anglican Diocese of Sydney and is the seat of the Archbishop of Sydney, Australia.



The first foundation stones were laid in 1819 but then further building was soon abandoned. New foundations were laid in 1837 but as the original layout was rather small, the architect had to use a style know as Perpendicular Gothic, similar to the style of Canterbury Cathedral. The building was consecrated on St. Andrew's Day (November 30), 1868.

The interior has a sense of grandeur, in part due to the lofty hammerbeam roof.



A hammerbeam roof is a decorative, open timber roof truss typical of English Gothic architecture.

The stained glass windows represent parables of Jesus and include those at which the Apostle Andrew was present.

The cathedral was traditionally oriented on an east-west axis, with the main door to the west and the sanctuary to the east. Over time this was found to be unsatisfactory as outside a main thoroughfare was put in on one side and a tram line was built on the other side. So in 1941 the interior was reoriented. However, in 1999 the interior was restored to the original layout and the sanctuary was moved back to the east end.

One of the treasures of the cathedral is the Great Bible, printed in 1539 and donated to St. Andrew's by a parish in England in the 1950s.

The organ consists of parts of two organs, one having been installed originally in 1866 and the other in 1932. The cathedral has a peal of 12 bells, cast in England and installed in 1965, and which are rung each Sunday morning.
