



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Pastor Gail's Ponderings

God Leads Us On Our Journeys

As many of you already know, my husband and I are going on an adventurous journey this summer. It has given me an opportunity to think about my life and what is most important. For both David and me, our faith in Jesus Christ is what comes first in our lives. But what does that mean on a practical level? Throughout the New Testament, Jesus invites people to follow him, to walk with him, to go on a journey. There is nothing particularly new in this, as the Hebrew scriptures are full of stories of wanderers, pilgrims, exiles, and immigrants.... However, in the gospel of John, Jesus upped the theological ante. He not only taught a way inviting the curious to follow him, but he said he was the way: "I am the way, and the truth, and the life" (14:6).



That is a beautiful verse, a poetic and parabolic image of the way and the Way, a beckoning for all who know Jesus to willingly embrace the journey. "No one comes to the Father except through me." The path to truth and life is none other than the one who is that truth and life. These 3 nouns—way, truth, life—designate the truth we find in Jesus. As we walk with Jesus, we find that Jesus leads us to our Creator God. "Way" is not a technique or map; "truth" is not about philosophy or dogma; and "life" is not about going to heaven. In the mystical poetry of John, Jesus uses these terms to explain how he embodies a way of being in this world that is so close to the heart of God that God can be known in and through Jesus.

Diana Butler Bass, in her book *Freeing Jesus: Rediscovering Jesus as Friend, Teacher, Savior, Lord, Way, and Presence* tells the story of a Christian community organized around two spiritual journeys—the interior one toward knowing our true self and knowing God, and the one directed outward into the world to enact God's justice and love. These two movements comprise the way of Jesus, a continual flow of breath: in, out; in, out; in, out....

This quest is a mapless journey—there is no single road—the only guides to it are nature, saints, poetry, song, and Spirit. When you dare leave the map behind, Jesus emerges as the road itself and the Light that guides. The Quakers refer to this as the "inner light;" medieval mystics speak of Jesus likewise. Of it Meister Eckhart wrote: "There is a journey you must take. It is a journey without destination. There is no map. Your soul will lead you. And you can take nothing with you." On the mapless journey, however, all is movement. There is no destination, only the enveloping presence of love.

While we are away from Roseburg, I ask for your prayers for a Safe Journey and that we come back wiser, more spiritual, and more resilient.

Sue informed us that there was a profit of \$42 from the great Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner—always good food thanks to Sue and Jerry Phelps. And thanks to Faye Benham and Margaret Thomas for today's lunch—nummmmm.

Sue also is asking for volunteers to put snapshots and news articles about our church in albums. The materials will be in the office, if anyone is interested in working on one or more.

Sue, Nancy, and Karla discussed the framing of Bob Robins's photos of the stained glass windows in the sanctuary. After they are framed, the plan is to remove the green bulletin board in the hall and hang some or all of the collection there. We will revisit this when they have an idea of the cost.

May 4-6 will be the rummage sale. So, if you haven't already begun, it's time to gather up your donations. We would start our set up the Sunday before.

We also decided to have the United Thank Offering campaign again this Lent. Betty Jo will put up information on the bulletin board and add boxes on the tables for people to pick up on Sunday.



Our speakers were Hollie and Jeremy Grammon, the new directors of the Dream Center. They gave us so much information about themselves and the Dream Center. Their families had a personal connection through their grandparents. Both families are firmly based in their faith which leads to their work in their churches which also led to the work with people in need and the Dream Center. They consider this a restorative ministry.

One of their biggest successes is the fact that many former clients are now volunteering at the center. At one time they had only four volunteers to help 300-500 people and now they have 41 volunteers feeding and clothing 800 clients. Clients are not only homeless, but also low income, vets, and elderly.

The Dream Center is part of a group of other agencies helping the same population called Connecting Point. They meet each day of the week at a different agency location to provide services and opportunities to apply for jobs or help. They served 650 people last Thanksgiving at the fairgrounds. We thanked them for coming to our meeting with a check and clothing we brought from home.

Their current hours are 10-2 Monday through Thursday, and they are hoping to increase those hours. They are also getting a dental hygiene trailer ready for service which will be a nice addition to their shower trailer. And they always need mens 28-32 pants and clothing for women under size 14.

Thanks to Thelma's good memory, her thought for the day is "always wear glasses so you can find all the things you couldn't find."
