# **Pastor Gail's Ponderings ....**

How wonderful it is to smell the flowers as we walk in the parks, gather with friends outside, or enjoy the fragrance of freshly cut flowers from our garden. Spring is indeed a marvelous time. "Earth Day" was on April 22 and I will take the time to GIVE THANKS TO OUR GOD and OUR CREATOR! What a blessing it is to live on our Mother Earth, created by God to give us nourishment and encouragement. On Sunday, May 10, Mother's Day, I'll be sharing more about how we have an attitude of "Care for God's Creation," from a very Christocentric way of exploring the way we walk on Earth.

Let's take a look at a passage that is all about the Resurrection–Living in Hope.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you." These words were sent by Peter from Rome to the churches in Asia Minor while he was awaiting trial. They give us great encouragement and hope.

Let's think back to the text from Luke 24. I think some of the saddest words in the Bible are, "But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem *Israel,*" spoken by the disciples who were on the road to Emmaus on that afternoon, almost 2000 years ago. They were joined by Jesus as they trudged back to their village. But they did not recognize him until he revealed himself to them in the breaking of the bread. They had despaired because the man who had raised so many hopes with his miracles and holy teachings had been cruelly killed. They thought that their hope had died with Jesus on the cross. Once Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his disciples, they recognized him. Jesus revealed himself in the "breaking of the bread." They knew instantly the truth of the women who had come back from the tomb saying that the stone had been rolled away and that two angels told them Jesus had arisen. What they had thought an idle tale was TRUE! Their hope, joy, and ultimately their salvation were true.

Sometimes, we in the church can feel somewhat hopeless, somewhat adrift. When there is a change in leadership, or a friend dies, or someone we love is sick-we can feel hopeless. Sometimes our church's finances can be uncertain, or we would like to have more visitors who become members, or we feel like we need to be uplifted, rather than doing the uplifting. We had hoped things would be easier. But that kind of hope dies when our sinner-sides show up for church as often as our saintly-sides. Fortunately, by God's grace, we have a deep hope that sustains us in disappointment and failure. Through the water of Baptism we are permanently connected to a hope that lives no matter what the world does. The deepest truth of our life together is the certainty that God has already won the victory over death and hopelessness. Living and working in that hope equips us to do the work of Christ and his church.

Leaders are called by God to build a bridge from the hopelessness of mistrust and judgment to the living hopefulness of joy, mercy, and peace. That bridge is built from the bricks that God gives us to structure the life of faith, regular worship, Bible study, daily prayer, acts of love for our neighbor, holy listening to one another, and a selfless hospitality that welcomes every person as a gift from God.

We cannot build that bridge alone. God gives us the tools, guides our hands, and fills our hearts as we work. God has given us a living hope that has the power to transform the world with love and gather all people to Jesus Christ. By God's grace we are saved from despair and freed to lead in HOPEFULNESS. Amen, let it be so.

Thurs., May 5, 4:00-6:30 Fri., May 6, 9:00-4:00 Sat., May 7, 9:00-noon


It will be \$3 a bag Thurs. and Fri. and \$1 a bag on Sat.




