#### Dear Friends,

I write this as we pack for our Diocesan Convention. More on that on Sunday. Also, congratulations to those who made the rummage sale a great success. I was amazed by how much was passed on and how much was earned. St. George's has a remarkable ECW.

The Church year is winding down. We celebrate All Saints on the first Sunday of November, including remembering those saints who have been a particular blessing to each of us. In one sense, all the baptized are called saints. You and I are blessed with a "great cloud of witnesses," as we "run the race" of our lives.

Then the last Sundays before Advent reference the "last things," death, judgement, hell, and heaven. On the last Sunday before Advent, we hail Christ the King.

### **FISH Report**

The October 27 Fall Food Drive at local grocery stores brought in 4726 pounds of food and \$727.05 monetary donations. FISH says "We are so thankful to have such a giving community that shows compassion and kindness. Thank you for all the donations that were made today throughout Roseburg."

And special thanks to St. George parishioners Nancy Baum, Jean Bowden, Mik Carlson, Jewell Gates, Betty Jo Hoffman, and Tricia Holt, the volunteers who staffed Albertson's that day. The October Roseburg Food Project collection of donated food brought in 13,057 pounds, collected by 73 Neighborhood Coordinators from 694 food donors. This is the best October collection in the six years of the project.

The next RFP pickup day will be Saturday, December 15.



### **Give Thanks in All Circumstances**

#### **Stewardship Drive**

Each November Episcopalian parishioners make a financial commitment to their church. We pray and reflect in order to come to a spiritual decision about how much to give.

By promising to donate regularly, we show that we are committed to God's work and that we are not afraid we won't have enough for ourselves. We demonstrate our love and gratitude to God in a tangible way.

Consider tithing (10% of what we earn) as your pledge. But in any case, realize that proportional giving is the biblical standard those who have more are expected to give back more. Often, the smallest gift is the largest, as told in Luke 21:1-4, the story of the Widow's Offering.

If you haven't already received your pledge envelope, check with the office. The forms need to be returned by the end of **November**. And remember, a stewardship commitment can be changed at any time.



Stewardship is about being grateful, responsible stewards of the gifts we receive from God. The Episcopal Church sees stewardship as more than simply contributing money to the church; it's also about contributing time and talents, and volunteering for ministry and mission. It's about reaching out to build relationships from a perspective of abundance instead of scarcity.

### Holy Eucharist Offering for the Clergy of Cuba by Pam Boston



One of the most moving moments of General Convention 2018 was the readmittance of the Diocese of Cuba to The Episcopal Church. This led the Rt. Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, former Presiding Bishop and current Assisting Bishop in the Diocese of San Diego, to challenge the House of Bishops to help fund the pension gap for clergy who have served the Diocese of Cuba since they were pushed out of this Church.

Bishop Katharine writes,

Clergy in Cuba have no access to state pensions or any equivalent of social security, for their service to the church is not recognized as employment, which is a function of the Cuban government. Their "retirement" requires enormous creativity and often means penury beyond what most Cubans already endure . . . . The pension gap is approximately \$800,000. Given the current census of Episcopalians, the need amounts to about \$0.50 per member of this Church. I write to ask you to offer a "mite" to aid the aged and aging clergy of the church in Cuba.

Bishop Michael has decided that the offering collected during the Holy Eucharist at our Diocesan Convention will be given toward the retirement fund set up specifically for clergy in Cuba, to support closing this pension gap for those who have served so long and faithfully.
