Let us dream of a church...
In which all members know surely and simply God's great love, and each is certain that in the divine heart we are all known by name; in which Jesus is very Word, our window in the Father's heart; the sign of God's hope and design for all humankind; in which the Spirit is not a party symbol, but wind and fire in everyone; gracing the church with a kaleidoscope of gifts and constant renewal for all.

Let us dream of a church . . . In which worship is lively and fun as well as reverent and holy; and we might be moved to dance and laugh; to be solemn, cry or beat the breast; in which people know how to pray and enjoy it whether in silence or word or song; in which the Eucharist is the center of life and servanthood the center of mission.

Let us dream of a church . . . With a radically renewed concept and practice of ministry; where there is no clerical status and no classes of Christians but all together know themselves to be the holy people of God; that is a ministering community rather than a community gathered around a minister.

Let us dream of a church...
So salty and yeasty that it really would be missed if no longer around; where there is wild sowing of seeds and much rejoicing when they take root and little concern for success, comparative statistics, growth or even survival; so evangelical that its worship, its quality of caring, its eagerness to reach out to those in need cannot be contained.

Let us dream of a church . . . In which every congregation is in mission and each Christian is gifted for ministry; in which all are peacemakers and healers abhorring violence in all forms, as concerned with societal healing as with individual healing, with justice as with freedom, prophetically confronting the root causes of social, political and economic ills; that is true community – an open, caring, sharing household of faith where all find embrace, acceptance and affirmation.

Finally, let us dream of a people . . . Called to recognize all the absurdities in ourselves and in one another, including the absurdity that is LOVE; serious about the call and the mission but not so serious about ourselves.

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Letter from Bishop Neff

The Spirituality of Money

It is often said, and I believe it to be true, that the subject that Jesus talks about the most is the relationship between us and our possessions, particularly money. We must not forget that all that we are and all that we have is a direct gift from God or what we have done with the tangible and intangible gifts from God. Jesus' teaching about the role of money and possessions in our spirituality is important to us all as individual Christians and to us as the Christian community of St. George's.

I bring up the subject of the spirituality of money at this time for two reasons. First because this is the time of year when you are asked for your annual pledge for the support of this congregation both inside the church and outside its doors; in Roseburg, in the diocese, and in the wider church abroad. Secondly, I bring the subject up because St. George's has received a generous legacy gift.

All matters of finance in the congregation must be absolutely transparent to avoid any misunderstandings. We rejoice that St. George's has received a legacy gift. The vestry will decide on how to handle the proceeds at a special meeting on November 2. In the meantime, the vestry members will be talking among themselves and I invite you to express your opinions to the Wardens or other members of the vestry so that they do not make a decision in a vacuum. The vestry's decision will be communicated to the congregation.

Sometimes I am asked what is appropriate to pledge. It is a very personal and actually a very spiritual decision. From my experience I can suggest that one look at percentages rather than just a dollar amount. Dorothy and I return to God through the Church from the abundance God has given to us and what we have done with the many gifts we have been given: Ten Percent, off the top, before taxes. We were led to tithing after hearing a stewardship talk by Bishop Bigliardi in 1974. Considering tithing took our breath away. The first thing we did was to take a look at what percent we were already giving. It took us several years of incremental increases in the percentage before we reached the tithe mark; now it is simply the way we live.

Please prayerfully consider your gift back to God through St. George's this stewardship season.

We voted to donate \$200 to pay for the supplies for the "Snack Bags" so we can continue to help feed the poor. We recently ran out of filled Snack Bags, and we don't want that to happen in the future. It's hard for us to understand how God can permit the suffering of children. We watch the news and feel sickened by it. We witnessed it firsthand this month in our community as four children lost their mother in a senseless murder.

I spoke to a Child Development Specialist at one of their schools about it. His own son was awaiting the results of his bar exam and was very anxious about the results. He told his son that whatever the results, his son would still have everything he walked in with, including his father's love. The Specialist told me that one of the children affected by the mother's death returned to his elementary school for comfort. He said that at the end of the conversation the child gave him a hug. Being a father himself and one who had nearly lost his wife recently, he safely hugged him back. The child said "I love you" and the Specialist responded "I love you too" with the paternal instinct of a protective father. I have to believe in that moment Christ was present, hugging them both.

Our children need to know they belong to us, and we belong to them. Skinned knees, broken

vases, failed math paper or prodigal journey, they belong to us. We hope one day to be that child waiting at the gate for open arms.

At this time we have 110 children in our school district experiencing homelessness and 2806 children living below the poverty line. A smile, a kind word, a sense of security can help sustain them. Saturday, November 22nd at 9:00 a.m. the First Presbyterian Church at 823 SE Lane Avenue will host a Food Security Bag assembly. Please plan to come pray for the children and help feed them too! Each bag is not only paid for, it's prayed for.

Cathedrals of the World

St. George's Cathedral, Cape Town, South Africa

St. George's Cathedral is the Anglican cathedral in Cape Town and is the seat of the Archbishop of Cape Town.

In 1827, on a visit to South Africa, the Bishop of Calcutta consecrated land for a new Anglican church. The foundation stone for this church was laid on April 23, 1830 (St. George's day). The building was designed in the Gothic style and based on drawings of St. Pancras' church in London. This new church opened for services in December 1834 with a capacity for 1,000 people and 300 seats for the poor.

With the creation of the Diocese of Cape Town, the church was designated a cathedral in 1847, although it was only a modest parish church. The foundation stone for a new cathedral was laid in 1901 by the Duke of Cornwall and York (later to become King George V).

Work on the new cathedral was delayed by war and did not really start until 1904. Work continued slowly and only in 1930 was the memorial stone for the North Transept laid. Finally the Transept was finished in 1936 and it could be said that the cathedral was completed.

The glorious stained glass windows include both a white Christ and a black Christ. The cathedral has a wonderful set of ten ringing bells, which are rung every Sunday.

Desmond Tutu made history when he was elected Archbishop of Cape Town in 1986.
