Pastor Gail's Ponderings....

Grace, peace, and mercy from our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ.

First, I want to thank you for the collective vote of confidence you gave me by approving the new title you and our Bishop said I could have: Priest-in-Charge. I have an ELCA Lutheran friend in Spokane, WA, who about five years ago accepted a "Priest-in-Charge" position at St. David's Episcopal Church. I have been in touch with her numerous times during the process of becoming your Interim Rector and now the Priest-in-Charge. Like me, she found the similarities far greater than any differences in our denominations and she congratulates us on this journey.

Second, I feel very fortunate to be welcoming our *relatively* new Bishop Diana Akiyama to St. George's for a visit on October 10. I am excited that we are among the first of her visits since becoming our Bishop in January due to the difficulties and challenges of dealing with COVID. Let's welcome her with open arms and hearts. On that Sunday, we will be having a coffee hour, with socially distanced tables and individually wrapped treats. WELCOME, Bishop Akiyama!

With this in mind, I want to talk about <u>Building Unity</u>. In the Old Testament we find that before Israel had Kings, they had a series of leaders that were called Judges. One of their judges was Deborah, and from Judges 5:1-2, we read of a victory hymn that is ascribed to her, "When locks [hair] are long in Israel, when the people offer themselves willingly—bless the Lord!"

In their earliest days the tribes of Israel were scattered and fragmented. They were not yet an organized people, a single nation. But Deborah was a dynamic prophetess and a judge over the tribes of Israel. <u>Unity, loyalty, and community increased under her charismatic leadership</u>. Deborah sang a song of thanks to the leaders of the people who had caught the vision of being Yahweh's people and to the people themselves for their faithfulness. A nation was being born.

Believing in the potential and ability of the people around you—as Deborah did, and as Bishop Akiyama is doing—is like blowing upon the coals

of a fire. It is one life feeding and being fed by another life; it is animating and life-giving. Others know you believe in them by the confidence that is placed in them, the responsibility committed to their care, and the respect accorded their insight and instruction. Believing in others created a community of coequals. It makes a scattering of humanity into a gathering of community. The Church, and more specifically our Episcopal Church, is this gathered people. We are the bony structures, sturdy muscles, and throbbing heart of a God still active in our world. We need each other. We can share with each other. And we are more than each individual person when we worship and serve together.

The exercise of leadership is often the act of blowing a gentle breath of life across the vision and talent found in those around us. It has inspired and will continue to inspire unity of faith and commonness of purpose. It is to walk faithfully with God alongside one another. It is to "break bread and share the cup of God's blessing" with one another at the sacrament of the Eucharist. It is to sit at table with one another, offering prayers and thanksgiving for the One who is, Yahweh, and the one who is among us, Emmanuel.

Let us pray,

Breathe on us, Breath of God, and ignite us with your celestial fire.

Grant us a spirit of oneness and faithfulness that we may truly be the Body of Christ for the sake of the world.

Amen.


If you are able to help, please call 541-672-5242, and let them know how they can get in touch with you.

Rebuilding a Local Plank House

Parishioner Juliana Marez is the Roseburg Public School's McKinney Vento Program/ American Indian education/ Child Welfare Point of Contact for Roseburg Schools. It is apparent from talking with her that this is more than a job—it's a ministry.

In 2003 a group of local educators worked with a cultural advisor from the Karuk tribe to design and build the Plank House at Eastwood School's Outdoor Education property. Plank houses are the traditional indigenous dwellings of this area, which includes Southern Oregon and Northern California. The Plank House is one of six outdoor classrooms that focus on natural resources.





Currently Jeff Plummer, Cameron Pope, Jennifer Thompson, and I work together all year to bring this site to life. Other retired science teachers including [St. George parishioner] David Jackson have taken the lead on developing cultural science lessons at each site.

In partnership with the nine Oregon tribes and featuring our local tribe, the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Indians, we have developed presentations each year to model two perspectives and mutual respect for the students.

This evening at 7pm there will be hymn singing in the park across from the Church. Bring a blanket and come prepared to sin.


