Pastor Gail's Ponderings....

The Holy Cross Keeping Love in Mind

"For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." 1st Corinthians 1:18

Wisdom is hidden all around us and sages are found in ordinary places. We learn wisdom from our Elders. We gain confidence from those who take care of us physically—doctors, nurses, P.T.'s, dentists, etc. We learn from our church's Bishops, the learned scholars of the church over the last 2000 years, and from our parish pastors. We regain a sense of wonder, imagination, and awe from our grandchildren's interaction with nature. Just watch a young baby discover her own hands, or a young lad seeing the wonder of a butterfly coming out of its cocoon, or a four-year-old picking a new flower.

Here is a story I read in one of my books. A mother was standing in front of a shelf in a grocery store, intent on price comparison, and her small son sat enthroned in the shopping cart. He was giving her a running commentary on the weather, his desire for a candy bar, the importance of his stuffed bunny, AND the weariness of his task of assisting with the family grocery shopping (when he'd rather be playing outside). Then he paused and remembered what he'd heard last week in Sunday School–LOVE. He asked his mom, "Are we going to see Grandma and Grandpa today?"

Without turning her head his mother replied, "Yes, we are."

"Good," he said with a sigh, "They love me so much; I want to go and be with them."

So here's the question—Do we keep God's love in mind amid the distractions of the world? Do we allow our longing for God's love to guide our work as members, volunteers, and leaders of our church: St. George's Episcopal Church?

As we hear in the passage of 1st Corinthians: The sign of the cross seems foolish to those who do not understand its message. We sometimes get so lost in our vital Christian busyness that we forget to keep love in mind. It is God's great love shown through the cross as a sign of death, but we know that it is the sign of a love so amazing that we live in daily gratefulness for its gifts. And so we take a day during the church year—September 14—Holy Cross Day—to meditate on the meaning of the cross of Christ because it reminds us that God's power comes from sacrificial love and forgiveness.

In several recent homilies, I said "We all must gather at the foot of the cross. In humility and gratitude we offer ourselves as instruments of God's love and forgiveness so that the power of self-giving love can be offered to the world through our lives and through the ministries of our church."

Let us pray.
O Creating God,
by your cross
you have redeemed the world.
Keep us close to the cross in our actions
so we may depend on its power
more than worldly power.
Help us keep your love in mind.

Spotlight on Don Witt

Don Witt's radiant smile and distinctive husky voice welcome parishioners and visitors to St. George's on Sundays when he serves as an usher.

Don was born in 1930 in the San Francisco Bay Area in San Leandro, where he grew up. He joined the Navy and served from 1931-1955 as an aviation storekeeper. He spent eight months on an aircraft carrier in the Philippine Sea. Visiting ports of call may have been the beginning of his desire to see the world.

Once out of the Navy, Don took advantage of the GI Bill and attended the San Francisco Academy of Art from 1955-59. Alrevands he moved to New York City and worked in commercial art for three years. He returned to California and was employed by the Insendescent Lighting Company in San Leandro as a graphic artist for their catalogs and other publications.

Don pursued his love of travel by going on tours. He met his former wife in Madrid: German-born Kai who was familiar with the Bay Area because she had attended UC Berkeley. They were married in 1968 and had one daughter, Robyn.

Taking early retirement at age 62, Don was able to do what he loves best, traveling. He prefers guided rours so he can just enjoy seeing new places and new people. In 2002 Rodyn, who was living in Koesburg, entired Rodyn, who was living in Koesburg, entired joined St. George's in the middle of 2003. Slowly, he embraced more of church life and is now an usher, although he regrets he didn't get involved in the Vestry). (Editor's note: It's not too late to get involved in the Vestry).

A bad wreck in 2017 put him in Callahan Village Assisted Living for two and a half months. His back was seriously injured. He is thankful for the good support his church family gave him at the time (Nancy Baum and Karia Roady even rounded up furniture for him). His back still gives him some problems, but he does well for the most part.

Don and Robyn have two cats. He says, "We've always had cats—not that there's anything against dogs!"

is the Missioner for Thriving Congregations.





COLUMBARIUM FENCE

The Vestry has voted to purchase a wroughtiron fence to enclose the Columbarium and Sacristy steps. This will enhance the experience of visiting one's loved ones and will provide a quiet place to stop and think. Happy Hills Tree Service will trim the branches of the two trees in what will be our "Meditation Garden."

Bids from local businesses Quality Fence and Performance Fab were submitted and the Vestry chose Performance, who included a non-profit discount for a total of \$21,675. The cost will be taken out of the Charles Cornwell Memorial Fund and a plaque in his remembrance will be placed on the fence. Work will not begin until October, and a dedication of the fence will take place after church when the project is completed.

Southern Convocation Report by Margaret Thomas

Southern Convocation Met August 13, 2022 at St. Luke's in Grants Pass.

- The main business was to review and vote on the proposed 2023 diocesan budget.
- The convocation unanimously approved the budget to go to convention. This year's convention will meet by Zoom on October 29.
- Gwen Best from Holy Spirit in Sutherlin is on the budget committee and said that it is a balanced budget. The total is a little over \$2 million, which is \$93K more than last year; it's all covered, and dedicated to services throughout the diocese.
- The diocese's goal is to get more parishioners, to get more income.
- There are reserve funds for congregations that can't meet their DPA; and those congregations are in conversation with the diocese.
- Rev. Ernestein Flemister at St. Luke's wants the southern convocation churches to find ways to be in community more often, and to connect with each other. There will be a common worship service (not a Eucharist) and picnic meal on Sunday, October 23, at 2:00 p.m., for all the churches in the convocation at Rinehart Park in Grants Pass. The theme will be Unity and Healing. Hot dogs and hamburgers will be provided by St. Luke's; the rest will be potluck.
- St. Mark's, Medford, is in transition with no interim priest yet. Rev. Tony Hutchinson, retired from Trinity, Ashland, is their supply priest.
- Trinity in Ashland's interim is Rev. Janell Monk, with the ELCA—like our Pastor Gail.
- Holy Spirit in Sutherlin is still looking for a 1/4 time priest. They also are searching for an organ—it has to have buttons.
- Someone mentioned that the bishop said the Episcopal Church is a target; that there should not be more than one point of entry to a church/building, and the buildings should have safety doors.
- There will be a Saturday, December 3rd convocation meeting in Roseburg. Convocation President Hana Rubens would like it to be fun and party-like. It would be great if our congregation would come and meet the folks from down south!





Inspiration

Funerals, in fact, are one of the most powerful examples of collective pain. They feature in a surprising finding from my research on trust. When I asked participants to identify three to five specific behaviors that their friends, family, and colleagues do that raise their level of trust with them, funerals always emerged in the top three responses. Funerals matter. Showing up to them matters. And funerals matter not just to the people grieving, but to everyone who is there.

The collective pain (and sometimes joy) we experience when gathering in any way to

celebrate the end of a life is perhaps one of the most powerful experiences of inextricable connection. Death, loss, and grief are the great equalizers.

An experience of collective pain does not deliver us from grief or sadness; it is a ministry of presence. These moments remind us that we are not alone in our darkness and that our broken heart is connected to every heart that has known pain since the beginning of time.
