

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Tossing and turning into the night are the llyrics from the animated movie Anastasia. The mysterious and sinister Rasputin begins: In the dark of the night, I was tossing and turning And the nightmare I had was as bad as can be It scared me out of my wits A corpse is falling into bits

Then I open my eyes and the nightmare was me.

Tossing and turning into the night is some thing we all do and there are many reasons, sleep disorders, worry, fear, depression, excitement, caffeine, too much or too little to eat, alcohol, stress, raising children, pain, restless legs, running to the bathroom, and I'm sure you can fill in a few more. Like a ship adrift on a wild sea our bodies, minds, and souls can find no calm and quite harbor. We might feel like Rasputin's corpse falling to bits especially in the morning when we arise having found no rest.

I've spent a lot of restless nights troubled by sleeplessness so I spent last night at the Mercy Sleep Center. Some of you know what I'm talking about. Connected to wires from your legs to the crown of your head, tubes in your nose and on your lips, bands around your waist and chest, oximeter on your index finger, a bed which sags where many have slept, uncomfortable pillows, someone bothering you on an intercom, watching and recording you by camera all night long, entering the room every time a wire or tube comes loose, and then waking you up at 6:30 am when you feel like you have barely slept.

So tossing and turning is on my mind and maybe yours. What troubles you and from what can you find no rest? What keeps you awake at night, infiltrates your dreams, and keeps you uneasy during the day? I suggest that these are the places where God is closest to you. These are the places where listening may bring its reward. These are the places where a change of heart or action is required. These are places of deep

struggle and holy ground. I always like the example of Jacob wrestling with God as he tried to rest alone one night on the banks of the Jabbok River. He wouldn't let God go and there God blessed him and gave him a new name. He was rewarded as one who had striven with God and with humans and prevailed. He was also left wounded.

On Sunday's we've been following the struggles of Job as he watches and suffers the loss of his good fortunes. He refuses to give up although his friends try to shame him and his wife advises him to curse God and die.

He says:

When I lie down I say, "When shall I rise?" But the night is long,

and I am full of tossing until dawn. Job 7:4

The Psalmist of ancient days inquires of God:You have kept count of my tossings; put my tears in your bottle.

Are they not in your record? Psalm 56:8

Tossings and turnings are the things of a life always calling us into the epicenter of God. When rest won't come and neither sleep nor waking is peaceful God is most assuredly there. We've all recently watched and witnessed with those suffering in the wrathful path of hurricane Sandy, with those who have had their lives tossed and turned by the power of nature and so I close in prayer.

As the waters recede,

As the embers from the fires cool, As Sandy's winds abate and the sky clears, As the early morning sun lightens the darkened cities,

Surely the presence of God is with you in this time of destruction and grief,

And our thoughts and concerns for your safety and recovery remain,

To Be More Aware

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness month and many of us have participated in some activity or event to heighten awareness about the importance of prevention, early detection and treatment for breast cancer. Statistically one in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer—every year.

We, as a church, have been praying for one of these women. Her name is Erin.

We have been praying for Erin Hughes. She is a forty year old single mom with two young boys living in Spokane, WA.

She went in for her first mammogram and was

diagnosed with an advanced stage of breast cancer. When she started treatment it was found that most anti-nausea and anesthesia medications aggravate a rare heart condition that affects both Erin and one of her sons. She received a pacemaker and has recently completed her third course of treatment and is doing well.

She has a great support group. They have started a blog site and are helping with fundraising for her treatment.

Lunch with Rev. JoAnne & Hana



OH, WHEN THE SAINTS?

Robert Grosseteste, Bishop of Lincoln



Robert Grosseteste (1175-1253)

Robert Grosseteste came from a humble background in Suffolk, England. He was very bright and the Church sponsored his education at Oxford and in Paris. Due to his charm, intellect, and piety he was made Rector of Oxford and in 1186 was consecrated Bishop of Lincoln. He was diligent in visiting the people and clergy of his diocese and relieved any clergy of their duties whom he found neglecting their pastoral duties.

He was a commentator and translator of Aristotle, but opposed many of his ideas in favor of Augustine. He promoted greater weight to the study of science, and Oxford began to embrace the teaching of physics, mathematics and geometry. Roger Bacon was a pupil of Grosseteste, and John Wycliff was strongly influenced by him as well.

On a trip to Rome he stood up boldly against some of the corruptions of the Church, and came back to England to the applause of the people. He was a man of piety and courage, defending his diocesan prerogatives against both the papacy and the king. He witnessed the signing of the Magna Carta which he strongly supported. Robert Grosseteste held the position of Bishop of Lincoln until his death in 1253.
